IRIS TIP OF THE MONTH:
ROOT ROT TREATMENT:

- 1. TRIM AWAY THE ROT.
- 2. DISINFECT THE
 REST OF THE
 RHIZOME WITH
 EITHER A SULPHUR
 DUSTING OR A
 BLEACH SOAK,
 MADE OF 5%
 BLEACH
 SOLUTION (1
 PART BLEACH & 19
 PARTS WATER)
- 3. SOAK FOR 20 30 MIN. AND RINSE WELL.
- 4. ALLOW TO DRY
 FOR SEVERAL DAYS

A SPRINGTIME IRIS WELCOME TO NEW MEMBER KRISTEE WEST!

Hi, I'm Kristee West, a new member in TAIS. In October, 2011, I moved from Las Cruces, NM to Quail Creek in Green Valley, AZ., and of course had to bring some irises with me. I dug and donated many to the Mesilla Valley Iris Society for their sale in September, so there were only 20 of my very favorites to plant when I arrived. I haven't figured out where the best place to locate my raised beds will be, so my irises are planted in various kinds of pots. The best growth so far has been in the self-watering 31" window boxes with Miracle Grow Moisture Contro I potting mix that have had great daylight on the south side of the house from November until February. I moved them to the east side of the house on February 11th. Wish me luck for the first year bloom in their new location.

In June 2000, I moved from Rochester, NY to Las Cruces, and of course had to bring some irises with me. The east northeast bed that I planted them in had over 6 hours of sunlight when I planted them, but as my landscape trees and shrubs grew, less than one quarter of the bed had sufficient daylight to keep the irises blooming reliably.

In 1991, I moved to a different house in Rochester, and my neighbor gave me several varieties of tall bearded irises. It was my first attempt to grow iris myself, but I already had caught the 'iris virus' as a young girl in my grandmother's vegetable garden in Lakewood, CO.

IRIS COLOR PATTERNS (FROM BASIC IRIS CULTURE - BY ROY EPPERSON)

The genus iris is named for Iris, the goddess of the Rainbow, because irises show a great range of color and color patterns. There are approaches to red, but no red iris. The following descriptions will aid you in identifying the types of colors of iris:

- 1. SELF Standards (upper petals) and falls (lower petals) are the same color. A true self also has beards of the same color.
- 2. PLICATA A color pattern where a lighter ground color is stippled, dotted, or stitched with a darker color emanating from the margins of the petals.
- 3. BITONE Flowers have standards and falls of different amounts of the same color. Ordinarily the falls are darker than the standards. When the standards are darker, it is called a "reverse bitone."
- 4. BICOLOR Standards and falls are a different color, the falls usually being darker than the standards.
- 5. BLEND A color pattern where a combination or mixture of two or more colors are present in the same parts of the flower.
- 6. AMOENA Standards are white and falls are a different color. A reverse amoena has white falls and standards of a darker color.
- 7. VARIEGATA A bicolor with yellow standards and darker, usually red falls.
- 8. NEGLECTA A blue or violet bicolor with darker colored falls.
- 9. LUMINATA The falls have a brushed pattern, with paler veins and a clear, unmarked area (spot) around the beards.
