The Mid-America Garden Club iris order has gone in and it will arrive by August 15th for our potluck, auction and Club Iris Awards. Tall Bearded Iris Society did not have a sale this year, so with the permission of a majority of the Board Members, I sent \$400 to Mid-America and \$80 for postage.

Our sale this year will consist mostly of irises from Gordon's garden and recent introductions from Mesilla Valley Iris Society in Las Cruces, NM. Gordon will need help in harvesting his irises. Those of us who have been growing iris for a while, tend to forget that we all started with nearly no knowledge of the care and feeding of our favorite flower.

This series of articles is being written for our new members who are just being introduced to the world of iris. There are thousands of cultivars of nearly 200 varieties according to AIS. Our aim is not to produce a phone directory, so we will focus on about a dozen forms in the next year. They will include most of the following:

Bearded– includes dwarf, intermediate, border and tall.

Beardless– Siberian, Japanese, Louisiana, yellow and blue flag.

Our June article will start with the ever popular Tall Bearded iris which has been a garden favorite since the time of the pharaohs.

Did you know: Iris means rainbow. The iris was the flower of the Greek goddess IRIS, the messenger of love. The iris symbolizes eloquence. Iris is the state flower of Tennessee. Some standard abbreviations it will helpful for you to know throughout this series of articles.


Seed Exchange ?
